SNAP & WIC OUTREACH PILOT

We are thrilled to announce that we received a **second year of funding from the MetroWest Health Foundation,** which will enable Giuliana to continue her efforts as our SNAP and WIC Outreach Coordinator. With this funding, we will keep adjusting and expanding our pilot to become more impactful and supportive.

As a result of some shifts to our approach, Giuliana has seen an uptick in requests for application support, which is an exciting development. FOOD POLICY UPDATES

OUR ADVOCACY EFFORTS

- Early in the summer, we **joined urgent phone-banking efforts** in states where Congresspeople most needed to hear from their constituents, in an effort to stop the "Big Ugly Bill." We were devastated to see this package pass, and we will continue advocating with partners to mitigate the harms from this bill.
- We met with Senate President Spilka's office to support efforts aimed at addressing SNAP benefit theft, including advocating for the implementation of chip EBT cards and for the replacement of stolen SNAP.
- We continued advocating for supplemental funding to restore previous levels of HIP benefits, tiered by household size. Efforts included calls and emails, sign-on letters, and coalition meetings.

FEDERAL AND STATE CHANGES

SNAP work requirements: On August 1st, DTA began terminating SNAP benefits for adults ("ABAWDs") who are subject to a 3-month time limit. The rules in place currently impact adults ages 18-54 who are not exempt from or meeting the rules (to learn more, see MLRI's Guide on the ABAWD Work Rules). DTA is waiting



for federal guidance before taking action to implement a vast expansion of this time limit to include adults up to age 65, families with children 14+, veterans, and others.

More changes coming to SNAP: We are sharing some resources that may be helpful for understanding the scope of the reconciliation package, implementation timeline and harm to low income households with regard to SNAP changes.

- CBPP timeline: When SNAP, healthcare, tax and climate provisions go into effect.

Addressing SNAP benefit theft in Massachusetts: Following <u>advocacy efforts</u>, Governor Healey recently signed into law an FY25 supplemental budget that includes \$15.5 million for DTA to issue chip EBT cards to prevent benefit skimming. Unfortunately, the package does not include funds to replace stolen SNAP.



Restoring HIP to prior levels: A nearly year-long advocacy campaign resulted in the passage of funding to restore HIP benefits to their original \$40/\$60/\$80 per month, depending on household size. This change took effect on September 1st!

ADVOCACY OPPORTUNITIES

1 SNAP ADVOCACY SUPPORT



As the Governor's Anti-Hunger Task Force gears up, MLRI and the other organizations appointed to the Task Force want to hear from you about strategies that can mitigate the harm.

MLRI is also asking to hear about any clients who were cut off from SNAP due to the ABAWD Work Rules. You can use <u>this form</u>, or <u>email Vicky</u>. They need case examples to advocate for improvements with DTA - both now and in the future when these rules expand.

TRANSPORTATION & AGRICULTURE TESTIMONY



We encourage you to submit written testimony for these bills:

- H.3623 An Act relative to fare free buses
- <u>H.3658</u> An Act establishing a special commission on micro-transit. (this is related to establishing on-demand and demand-responsive transportation systems to get residents to jobs, appointments, and services).
- <u>S.55/H.112</u> An Act fostering agricultural resilience in Massachusetts (the FARM bill) (this includes a number of reforms to support farms and farmers and preserve valuable farmland)
- <u>S.56/H.109</u> An Act protecting our soil and farms from PFAS contamination. (Senator Comerford's office has requested to be CC'd on written testimony <u>jo.comerford@masenate.gov</u>).
